<sup>5</sup> And now, do not be distressed and do not be angry with yourselves for selling me here, because it was to save lives that God sent me ahead of you.

"Like a defibrillator God's grace shocks us, not to hurt us but to restart our broken hearts."



- 1. Where have you seen God's blessings this week?
- 2. Have you ever experienced unexpected kindness from someone. How did it impact you?
- 3. What would be natural human responses if someone who had deeply wronged you was suddenly at your mercy?
- 4. Who in your life is really good at making peace when there's conflict? What do they do that works?

Revenge. We all know what it is like to be tempted to take revenge on those who have hurt us. In fact, we could say that in our culture and society seeking revenge is an expected reaction. Few people would question it. But as much as revenge may feel good and perhaps bring temporary relief, the scriptures, psychologists, and basic wisdom point to the fact revenge is destructive, as it tends to harm the one seeking it more than the one it targets. In this pivotal moment in the story of Joseph, Joseph—who had every human reason to take revenge against the brothers who sold him into slavery—instead of revenge chose forgiveness and restoration. In doing so he reveals how God works through even our most painful circumstances to accomplish his greater purposes, turning what others intend for evil not only into something good but also into an opportunity to see and experience God's transformative and amazing grace.

- 5. What verse/concept/teaching in this reading caught your attention and what was challenging/confronting/comforting about it for you?
- 6. What emotions do you hear in Joseph's voice as he reveals himself?
- 7. How do the brothers respond to Joseph's revelation, and what does this tell us about their expectations?
- 8. What reasons does Joseph give for not seeking revenge?

Rather than revenge, which would have been the expected response, we see instead God's plan and transforming grace working through Joseph's response to his brothers. Joseph recognises God's hand, declaring three times that "God sent me" ahead of them to preserve life (verses 5, 7, 8). The grace that enables Joseph to choose reconciliation over revenge reveals God's transforming work in his heart, making him an instrument of salvation for his family and countless others. Through Joseph's forgiveness, God's plan to preserve his covenant people unfolds not through judgement, but through radical grace.



- 9. Joseph says "God sent me before you to preserve life" (v. 5). How does this perspective transform his view of his brothers' betrayal? How might it challenge us in our response to those who have hurt us?
- 10. How does Joseph's forgiveness reflect God's heart toward us, and how does this inspire our own practice of forgiveness and reconciliation with others?



God's grace transforms our deepest wounds into instruments of His purpose. Joseph's declaration that "God sent me before you to preserve life" shows us that even painful experiences can become the foundation for purposeful living when we allow God's grace to work through them. Rather than being defined by what was done to him, Joseph chose to be defined by what God was doing through him. This same grace invites us to see beyond our hurts to discover how God might use our stories for his greater purposes, becoming agents of his reconciliation in a world that desperately needs the healing power of forgiveness.

- 11. What role does recognizing God's plan play in our ability to forgive those who have wronged us?
- 12. What would it look like to make God's grace—rather than your pain—the central story of your life?
- 13. How can you actively pursue reconciliation rather than simply waiting for others to make the first move?



- Praise Jesus, who like Joseph, chose grace over revenge and made ultimate reconciliation possible
- Ask for grace to forgive those who have wronged us. Ask for the Holy Spirit to show us God's perspective on our painful circumstances, to see his purposes beyond our hurt
- For those we know who are experiencing health issues-physical or mental health; those grieving; those struggling with general life issues.
- Thank God for working all things together for good, even when we can't see his plan. Thank God for the grace he extends to us daily, enabling us to extend grace to others
