Psalm 37:3-7,23-24

- ¹ Do not fret because of those who are evil or be envious of those who do wrong;
- ² for like the grass they will soon wither, like green plants they will soon die away.
- ³ Trust in the Lord and do good; dwell in the land and enjoy safe pasture.
- ⁴Take delight in the Lord, and he will give you the desires of your heart.
- ⁵ Commit your way to the Lord; trust in him and he will do this:
- ⁶ He will make your righteous reward shine like the dawn, your vindication like the noonday sun.

#3 For Anticipating The Future?





"When these things begin to take place, stand up and lift up your heads, because your redemption

is drawing near."

Luke 21:28



The only way to anticipate the future is to trust God will show up in every moment.

Most of us like to plan for the future — to get organised, stay prepared, and manage what's coming next. But Jesus turns that kind of planning on its head. In His teaching about the coming kingdom, He calls us not just to prepare *for* the future, but to prepare *with* Him — to expect His presence in every moment.

Preparing with Jesus isn't about stockpiling faith or predicting the next big thing. It's about staying close to Him in the ordinary moments of life — praying when we're uncertain, responding with grace when we're tested, and trusting His promises when things feel shaky. It means being ready for the ways God might show up in any moment; in the person who needs encouragement, in an unexpected opportunity to serve, or in the courage to face something hard. Anticipating the future, then, isn't about anxiety or control, but about walking daily with the One who already holds the future in His hands.

Read Luke 21:25-28 and Matthew 25:1-13 HERE or in your own Bible.

- 4. Try to summarise the main idea of these passages.
- 5. What verse/concept/teaching in these readings caught your attention and what was challenging/confronting/comforting about them for you?
- 6. Both passages speak about watching and being ready. What do you think Jesus wants his followers to be watching for?
- 7. In Luke 21, Jesus tells his followers to "stand up and lift up their heads." What kind of attitude or mindset do you think He's calling for here?
- 8. In Matthew 25, half of the group ran out of oil and missed the bridegroom's arrival. What might that 'oil' represent in our lives today?



Athletes who compete at the Olympic level don't just focus on the big event once every four years. Their daily routines — what they eat, how they train, when they rest — are all shaped by the goal they're anticipating. Every choice reflects their commitment to the future they're preparing for. In the same way, Jesus calls His followers to live each day with the future in view — not with fear or guessing games about what's coming, but with steady, faithful preparation for His return and His work in the world today.

Throughout the gospels, Jesus talks about the 'Kingdom of Heaven' or 'Kingdom of God' in two distinct ways. One as a future event when Jesus himself returns "the Kingdom of heaven *will* be like…", but the other way he talks about it is as a present reality. In fact, the present reality is mentioned far more regularly across Matthew, Mark and Luke's gospels. Jesus says thing like "the kingdom of heaven *is* like…" and "The kingdom of God is at hand/here/among you.

Take a quick look also at <u>Luke 10:8-9</u>.

- 9. If following Jesus is like training for a future goal, what kind of 'training habits' help you to stay spiritually fit and focussed
- 10. If, like Jesus says to the 72 disciples he sent out in Luke 10, the kingdom comes near every time Jesus' disciples bring healing and forgiveness in His name, what might it look like to anticipate, or be prepared, for the daily opportunities God asks you to be the means by which his kingdom comes?
- 11. In what ways do fear or distraction pull us away from consistent preparation? How can trust in God's promises and anticipating final fulfillment of Christ's victory help us to refocus?



MAKE IT REAL:

The athlete analogy is helpful when we think of the future as some far off, singular event like the Olympics. But the reality is that the future is every moment that God has planned out ahead of you. And when you are a follower of Jesus, with the Spirit of God at work in you, everywhere you go and everything you do becomes an opportunity for God to bring his kingdom in every moment. In this way, we might think of following Jesus more like an emergency service worker who trains and prepares to respond to whatever the next emergency is they are called to attend.

- 12. In Christ, we know our future is secure. What happens if you shift your focus from preparing for your own future to anticipating the return of Christ and what it might mean for those who do not yet know him as Lord and Saviour?
- 13. How easy or difficult do you find it to anticipate or expect God to turn up when you feel called to step out or take a leap of faith? How would you prepare/train to make that easier?
- 14. Can you think of anyone or any situation where God might be calling you to bring his Kingdom presence? What would you need or want God to do if you followed Him into that situation? How might you prepare to do that?
